

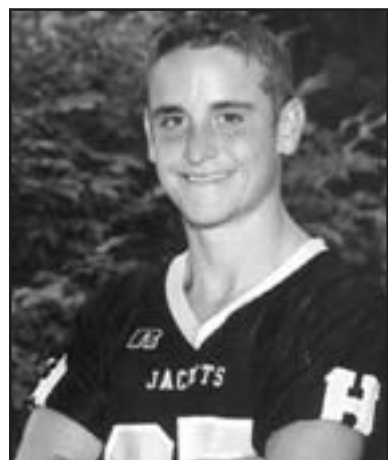

FarWest YouthBuild is a new program to the area. The governing body of YouthBuild is their policy council. The policy council are made up of YouthBuild students and were chosen by the students.

Water/sewer

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Also Thursday, Leek received permission to investigate water and sewer service on Highways 69 and 66 from Towns County. According to Leek, the Water and Sewer Advisory Board said they are in favor of allowing a line to be constructed from Towns County down Highways 69 and 66 to service North Carolina residents. However, there are questions concerning North Carolina water quality standards which differ from Georgia's standards.

A developer working on a project in Warne is interested in hooking up to the water system from Towns County, Leek said. He added that Towns County said they currently have all they can handle and suggested to Leek that Clay County service the 173 acre development in Warne.

Leek told the Water and Sewer Board that he would investigate the matter further, but that he wanted the board's input before he spent any more time on the issue. Jordan and Sellers said that they didn't see any reason not to look into it, but added that "looking into it" was all that the county needs to do right now.

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aides in the Third Grade. "That's the first year of testing for the children," he said. "It's also the time when they learn cursive writing."

Snow said the public school teachers have a pretty strong lobby to speak up for them, but that the teacher's aides do not.

"They are not well represented and don't make a lot of money," he said. About the issue, Snow said he felt like he made a difference there. Snow spoke of other instances where he got involved in the legislative process; to get funding for a fire truck for Western Carolina University; to pass a law to put Sudafed and other "Meth" products behind the counter; and steps taken to keep kids away from obscene material at game

rooms as well as stricter requirements to prevent solicitation on the internet.

In a pre-luncheon interview, Basnight said the major goals of the next legislation would be 1) getting people to work, 2) making the economy attractive for business and industry and building the infrastructure and educational system that supports the growing needs of the state.

Basnight said revenues from the state's lottery will be added to public moneys already budgeted for our schools. He said North Carolina already provides a greater percentage of its revenues for education than other states in the southeast and that lottery money will be added to that.

Clay County arrest report

A Hayesville woman is in the Clay County Jail, awaiting extradition to two states. According to Sheriff's officers, Karen Sue Scott, 41, was arrested Nov. 4 on a fugitive warrant out of Mesa County, Colo., that charged her with 31 counts of forgery and one count of theft. Officers say Scott's warrant was posted on NCIC, the FBI's nationwide criminal database accessed through the National Crime Information Center.

In an unrelated case, Tiffany M. Maringill, 28, of Hayesville, was also arrested on a fugitive warrant. Officers said Hall County, Ga., sought Maringill on a burglary warrant. She was arrested Nov. 3 and released on bail.
